Background to Festival Churches



- 2015 Church Buildings Review coined a phrase that caught on
- 2017 The Taylor Review: Sustainability of English Churches and Cathedrals A grouping such as an Association of Festival Churches may also offer a beneficial means of supporting such initiatives.
- 2019 changes to Canons BII, BI4 and B39
- 2020 The Association of Festival Churches Registered Charity 1191777
- **Charitable purpose**: Bring together and bring support to Festival Churches and those supporting Festival Churches and those who are considering whether or not a church should become a Festival Church.



Work of the Association of Festival Churches 2020-23



- Defining what it actually means
- Seeking case studies
- Engaging with stakeholders
- Planning bigger role-out, events, resources a project
- Fundraising to professionalise our operation and make the project happen





The Definition of Festival Church



• Doing less, but doing it better (in terms of public worship)


• Replacing regular, formal worship with Occasional gatherings whose form will respond to local needs and opportunities

• Adapting governance models to maximise local participation

• Enabling volunteers who have not previously been part of the church community to play an active role in managing the building

Consultation events and feedback in June/July 2021

- Series of four online stakeholder consultations during the summer of 2021
- Over a hundred people attended
- 36 written responses to online feedback form

Festival Churches Development Project



- 2022 AFC developed a fundable project to:
- Develop and offer a sustainable advice service to assist churches wishing to become Festival Churches.
- Identify existing resources, where they are missing, to create them.
- Add useful and engaging information to the AFC website.
- Collecting and evaluating case studies of FCs in action, demonstrating the breadth of the model within the C of E and ecumenically; identifying paths to success and key performance indicators.
- Exploration of the sustainability of AFC in the long term, including models of membership.





Festival Churches Development Project



- Successful grant bids to Benefact Trust and Buildings for Mission project
- Recruitment process early 2024
- Nigel Mills Festival Churches Development Officer appointed I May
- Annual conference in November more details shortly







Make friends of neighbors and the police

✤ Help neighbours to be eyes and ears for the church

Invite police to events at the church and to become familiar with the building

Give confidence to spot the unusual (photographing cameras not the nave)

Martyn's law – how aligned with what we want to do?

The bill is about keeping the public safe when gathered in your church

Requirement that should be in place Responsible person when there is an event

New concepts:

Keeping people safe inside, rather than outside

New requirements:

Standard tier terrorism evaluation Enhanced tier risk assessment and security plan. An evaluation must be completed to ensure that your premises is prepared for an attack. Providing the details set out for each of the six tasks will result in your 6-task plan. The tasks do not reflect the order in which they should be triggered in the event of an attack, and it may not be appropriate to complete all tasks. Each attack will generate a different response and completing a plan will enable a more effective response to be launched.

- Task 1 Plan to warn people on the premises that an attack is taking place
- Task 2 Plan to lockdown your premises

Complete the 6-task plan

PLAN

- Task 3 Plan to evacuate your premises
- Task 4 Plan to call the emergency services and relay the necessary information
- Task 5 Use available first aid and fire safety equipment

Task 6 - Consider how you can make your neighbours or local network aware of your plan and alert them of an attack

Record all the relevant actions on the template.
